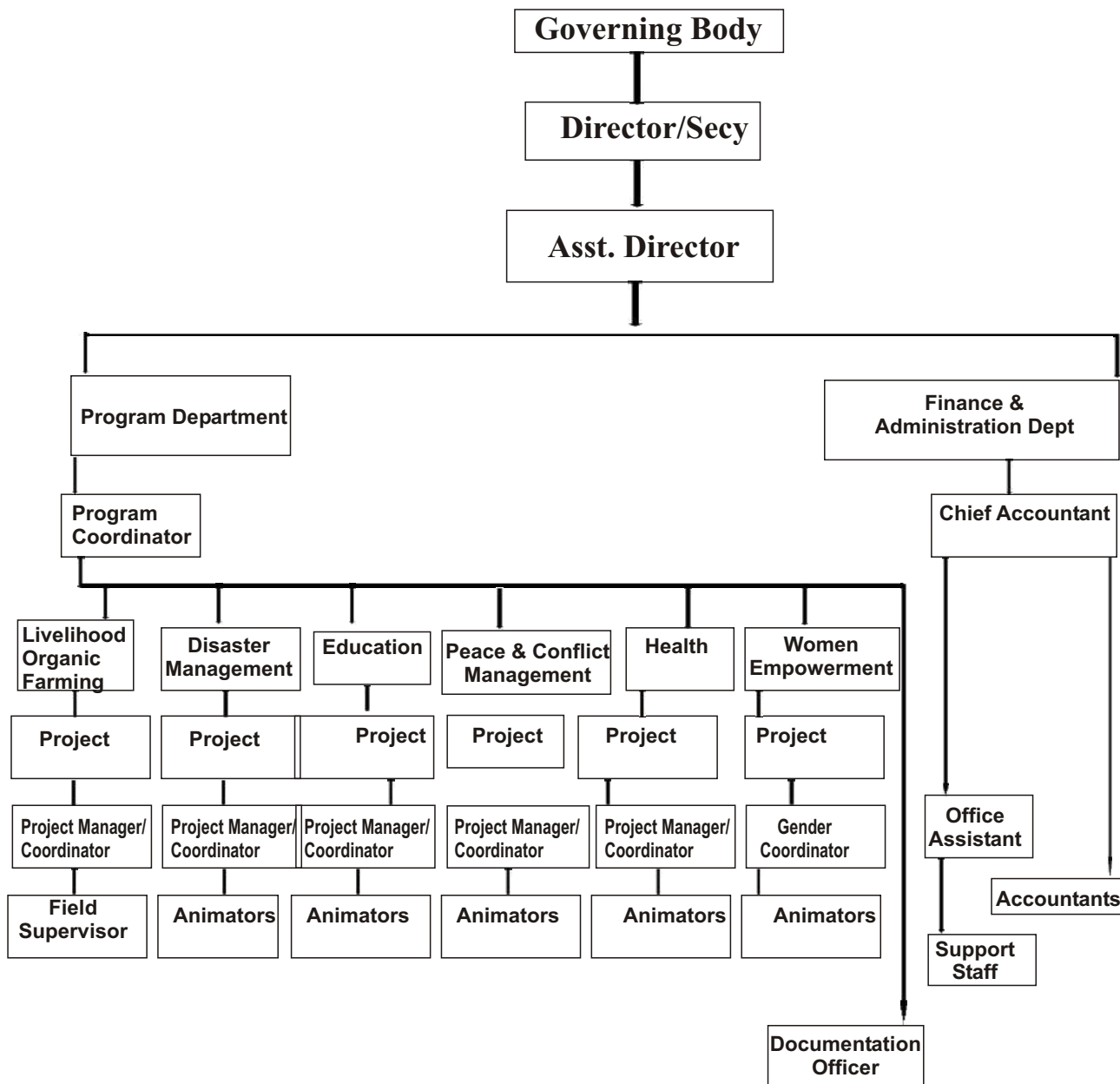

FARM NE III (Facilitating Agricultural Regeneration Measures North East)

FARM III project implemented villages completely new villages from FARM I & II. FARM III started implementing on 1st Nov. 2019. Over the last year since the start of this program there has been many ups and downs in implementing the program activities. There has been issue on CAB which result Bandh, strike and Curfew. The total lockdown of the state because of the pandemic covid-19 were faced by the people of the state which thereby hinders the smooth running of the program activities. However when the situations become better and relaxation of the lockdown the FARM team continue to build the rapport with the farmers with the permission from the village stakeholders. With the cooperation from the farmers and the village authority, the project program activities however conducted and fulfilled during the reporting period. In the FARM III, 14 new villages are implemented which comprise of 556 families with the population of 2704 in 3 districts Tengnoupal, Thoubal and Kangpokpi of Manipur.

From the month of July 2020 there were lot of changes in the activity because of the Covid pandemic. Awareness were given to the farmers and the community as a whole regarding the Covid-19 response and its purpose. Since there wasn't a single migrant in the project villages, beneficiaries were selected to those who are very poor, landless farmers, widows and who are very much in need. Beneficiaries were selected with the help of village authority, women society and Youths. Once the beneficiaries were selected, they were asked to form the group and the number of farmers forming the groups are 7-13. The groups will take the responsibility and look after the activity taken up. The activities were decided by the beneficiaries based on their needs. Then there has been extension period of three months from Oct 2020 to Dec 2020.

During the extension period of three months, the project activities were carried out accordingly. During this period, most of the activities were followed up of the project activities that had carried out earlier mainly the Covid response program activities apart from communities initiative activities. The selected beneficiaries were provided with the fruits saplings. Each beneficiaries got 100 saplings of Lemon, Litchi and Oranges. Other beneficiaries got 100 Saplings of Coconuts and Arecanuts seeds each base on the geographical and climatic areas. These are the main activities carried out during the extension of three months. Out of 14 villages, 7 villages were selected out of which beneficiaries were selected.

The period from April 2020 to March 2021, FARM NE project under DSSS Imphal conducted the listed below activities which includes Budgeted and Non-Budgeted activities.

FARM NE III PROJECT, ACTIVITIES DONE FROM APRIL 2020 TO March'2021

- Baseline Survey.
- Selection of villages for the developing of green belt forest in the community land thereby also promoting nutritional garden in the area.
- Selection of beneficiaries.

- Consultation and activity planning meeting with community.
- Promotion of nutritious backyard garden at family and School level.
- Demonstration and promotion of seasonal and multi-cropping.
- Documentation, dissemination and promotion of non-cultivated foods/vegetables.
- Knowledge sharing and exchange among the targeted communities on preservation of indigenous seeds.

PROJECT GOAL:

Empowering communities of 14 villages of Thoubal &Tengnoupal District of Manipur state towards leading healthier life through obtaining their food sovereignty.

OBJECTIVE 1: Targeted 556 farming families of Tengnoupal, Thoubal and Kangpokpi districts of Manipur will have sufficient food production and nutritional intake as per their cultural food habits.

OBJECTIVE 2: 556 farming families will have adopted and promoted indigenous seeds for cultivation and consumption.

Objective 3: Marginalized farmers from 14 villages will have control over the local market for the sale of excess organic products.

Activities based result**Baseline Survey:**

Baseline Survey has been done in the 14 projected villages. This baseline is for the selection of the villages for covid response program. Out of 14 villages; 11 villages in Tengnoupal, 2 villages in Thoubal and 1 village in Kanpokpi. Villages under Tengnoupal District: Kharou Khullen, Kharou Khunou, Choktong, Satang, Wabaching, Leibi, RRC, Ringpom, Maryland, Tonlen and Tuisen. Villages under Thoubal District: Yangkho and Saram. Village under kangpokpi District: Poirou. As per the given data the baseline survey work in 14 identified villages have been completed.

**Selection of beneficiaries and Distribution of saplings in 7 villages:**

Once the procurement of fruit trees saplings are ready, the staffs selected the most needy beneficiaries and saplings distribution is done in 7 villages. The saplings distributed are Lemon, Litchi, Oranges, Coconuts and Areca nuts.

**Consultation and activity planning meeting with community:**

This activity was conducted in 14 villages of FARM III. Project Village wise consultation and planning meeting was held to design the activities as per the need of the community keeping in mind the objectives of the program given below:

1. Facilitate and motivate the community to participate and contribute their ideas.
2. Facilitate the community to reflect on their past and present situation of cultivation patterns, food intake and the future trend



Promotion of nutritious backyard garden at family and School level

Family level interaction and motivation process is facilitated that will lead to initiation of improved backyard gardens by promoting eco-friendly techniques under Laudato Si and trellises for self-consumption of organic vegetables and surplus and surplus production for markets. This will reduce the burden on the family to buy from market and avoid consuming chemically produced food. The garden will provide food to the families throughout the year. Partner staff will identify local village schools and hold meeting with school management and teachers and motivate them to initiate nutritional garden. This will serve nutritional vegetable during midday meal. This also will motivate the children and guardians to start the same in their homestead. Promotion of Trellises for enhancing crop production. Best practices will be documented for the future use.



Demonstration and promotion of seasonal and multi-cropping

The staff of the farm project conducted an awareness program in 14 villages for the Promotion of Trellises for enhancing crop production: A dialogue process was initiated with the community by analysing quality and quantity production of food annually or seasonally and assess their dependency on market for food. Good and progressive farmers will be identified, and community demonstration with improved practices including trellises will be held in his/her garden. Viable indigenous seeds would be collected by farmers through exchange among themselves or between villages. Farmers would be taken back to the culture or practice of using throw away natural resources in their households to be converted to quality organic manure. This process will continue to sensitize the people to take up seasonal and multiple cultivation for self-sustenance and livelihood.



Documentation, dissemination and promotion of non-cultivated foods/vegetables

The staff made a field trip for the Identification of NTFPs (Non Timber Food Production) with the help of the village elders. The identified NTFPs will be documented in terms of usage as food, medicines and others. This activity is also carried out in 14 villages.

Knowledge sharing and exchange among the targeted communities on preservation of indigenous seeds

A village wise knowledge sharing programs was organized for people to share their knowledge and experiences of indigenous seeds and preservation methods. The best practices of seed preservation are documented for the future reference.



MANIPUR ORGANIC MISSION AGENCY UNDER MISSION ORGANIC VALUE CHAIN DEVELOPMENT FOR NORTH EASTERN REGION (MOVCDNER)

The MOMA Project under the Central Scheme of MOVCDNER has widely played an important role in the state of Manipur by helping out the farmers in nook and corner of the state to be self-sustainable. DSSS as a service provider directly interacted with the farmers and carried out various activities. Many success stories are being celebrated under the Service Provider of DSSS, Imphal. The FIGs (Farmer's Interest Group's) are well trained by giving various trainings and awareness programs on various activities. The project promotes the best practices of Organic farming by providing training on Concept of Organic Farming which makes the farmers to be aware of the practice of organic farming and the benefit of organic farming for health and environment. Four districts comes under the service provider of DSSS- Kamjong, Ukhrul, Noney and Tamenglong. The MOMA project supports the farmers directly by distributing turmeric seeds and soya seeds and distribution of baskets for easy cultivation and loading etc. Besides these, project carried out various activities like:

1. Training on Concept of organic farming.
2. Improve crop production practices, mixed cropping and multiple cropping.
3. Organic manure preparation, pest and disease management.
4. Post-harvest management and seed preservation.
5. Book keeping training (carried out time to time).

All the above mentioned activities were carried time to time in entire villages of project areas. The farmers are now aware of its importance in all the activities and they practiced it according to how the training was imparted to them. The project has played a vital role in helping them to be self-reliant and have set up a collection centre where the farmers can store their products. The project also helped the farmers by installing a drying machine where the farmers can dry their product without being spoiled. The project was carried out even in the remotest part of state with many success stories in the past as well as in the present.

EXTERNAL MONITORING

External Monitoring was conducted by the MOMA staff along with the Horticulture Department staff led by the Director, Shri Debadutta Sharma. The monitoring team visited interior village of Nunngang at Tamenglong district and made a tour to the turmeric farm interacting with the farmers, listening to their problems, and difficulties and the challenges they face in marketing their products.



Seeing the keen interest of the director in visiting himself in person to the far flang villages, the farmers promised to work harder in the coming years. Further, the Director of Horticulture, Shri Debadutta Sharma, promise to extend help from the Department side by providing Polly Bag house and also construct a collection centre. The Director was very impressed with the hard work and sincerity of the Nunngang turmeric farmers and complemented them for their efforts.

INTERNAL MONITORING

As usual, the MOMA staff of DSSS, Imphal conducted the internal monitoring, visiting the king chilly farm and turmeric farm at Ukhrul, Kamjong Tamenglong and Noney districts. The team reported that most of the crops were healthy and were pleased with the hard work put in by the farmers.

ORGANIC MANURE PREPARATION, PEST AND DISEASE MANAGEMENT

A holistic training on Organic manure preparation, pest and disease management was conducted by experts for the farmers of the Ukhrul, Kamjong, Tamenglong and Noney districts. The following training are imparted to the farmers:

1. Cow Urine plant extracts.
2. Preparation of waste decomposer.
3. Preparation of Vermi Wash.



INCOME GENERATING ACTIVITIES (IGA)

The most beneficial activities in the project area was the income generating activities which were carried out apart from the budgeted activities. Using these unbudgetted activities, the farmers learnt how to get benefit and generate income even in the process of training. The MOMA staff and FIGs were given training on PIGGERY MANAGEMENT, whereas, training on SCIENTIFIC MUSHROOM CULTIVATION was imparted for the FIGs leaders at ICAR, Lamphel. All these income generating activities were very useful and beneficial for the farmers as they could earn easily and sustain life long earnings and be economically self sufficient.

ONE CERT INTERNATIONAL PRIVATE LTD.

DSSS Imphal, as service provider for farmers in Manipur, has been facilitating various farmers groups. The Organic Grower Group of Tamenglong has 500 farmers. And their certified crops are turmeric, king chilly and orange. The allotted area per farmer is 1 hectares. During the year 2018 to 2019, they had received NPOP (National Program for Organic Production). The Organic Grower Group of Noney has 400 farmers. Its certified crop is turmeric. They have received IC (Inconversion 1). Organic Grower Group of Kamjong have 300 farmers and its certified crop is King chilly. They also have received IC(Inconversion 1). The Organic Grower Group of Ukhrul has 500 farmers. Turmeric and king chilly are the certified crops. They have also have received IC

CHALICE SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM DIRECT FAMILY PLANNING

Chalice Canada Sponsorship program began in 2011 at Imphal site with a vision to encourage and help the rural poor students access to better education. Since its inception, the project has sponsored 645 regular students and pursued their career. The program reach out to seven villages namely: Lamlongei (LAM) Imphal West District, Yaipharok (YAI), Phunal Khunjao (PKJ), Phunal Khunnou (PKN), Taoramphai (TAO), Shandangshenba (SDG) and Keihao (KEI) of Kangpokpi District.

PROJECT GOALS:

Education:

1. Ensure maximum number of children going to school and avail nutritious food/diet.
2. To avoid school dropout students.

Health & Hygiene:

1. Children and adults maintained good and personal hygiene by protecting themselves from various diseases.
2. To ensure good health of our sponsored children under Chalice Health fund.

Nutrition:

1. To increase the number of families in practicing small scale organic kitchen gardening, farming and produce good amount of traditional clothes.
2. Monitor the boarding school to provide nutritious balance diet to the children.

Community:

1. Ensuring the beneficiaries to live in a better houses.
2. Increase the level of awareness among the CCGs to take up various skills and developmental programs from Govt. Institutions and Organizations and understand the need of the community to address the issues for positive outcomes.

Family:

1. Increase awareness on various livelihood skills so as to improve their sources of income.
2. To orientate on DFF Sponsorship Programme to ensure all the families participate in the program activities.

Direct Family Fund/ Chalice Circle Groups:

1. Capacitate the other members of CCGs to take up leadership role and maintain their record books.
2. Increase more number of CCG families to take up Income Generating Activities.
3. Increase more NCA for the DFF sponsorship Program.



CHALICE IMPLEMENTATION IMPACT REPORT

Mr. Koman Morungman Maring

Mr. Koman Morungman Maring, 15 years of age from Phunal Khunjao Maring Village is a Chalice Canada Direct Family Funding Program sponsored student bearing Child Code PKJ1029 with a sponsor ID No. 1212763. His parents are a daily wages earner. The source of family income is through bamboo basket making and selling of seasonal vegetables. His sister is pursuing her Bachelor of Science from a government college in Imphal.



In the initial stage, prior to implementation of Chalice Sponsorship program in Manipur, his parents were worried of the child future career as they were unable to provide and meet all the expenses for him and his older sister.

The parents' dream and aspiration for better education for their children and the desire to send them to a well-established school, was fulfilled with the intervention of Chalice Sponsorship Program. The child got the sponsorship in the year 2012, in his fourth academic grade. He studied in St. George High School, Imphal. During the school visit and interaction with the concern teachers, he is a well behave, hardworking, sincere, honest and was always eager to learn new things.



The child was an average performer student in the initial period of his career, the reason being, the competition was very high in a well-established school in Imphal compare to his prior schools in the village governmental school. However, the child did not give up and worked hard to top the class. As a result of his hard work, his teachers started to recognized his academic performance. The child started to top the class from Grade Sixth.

In the course of his academic career, he also participate in various school curriculum like debating, extempore speech competition, Science Congress meet and quiz competition. His overall performance was satisfactory. He is now studying at Herbert School, Imphal, pursuing his Higher Secondary education in Science Stream.

A shy village boy, with limited dreams of pursuing higher studies due to the acute financial constraint of the family prior to Chalice Canada intervention, shared his happiness and immense gratitude with a teary eyes of heartfelt happiness to Chalice Canada for uplifting his spirit and providing better education. His parents also shared their happiness and gratitude to Chalice Canada for making their dreams come true. The child also shared that he would like to become an IAS (Indian Administration Service), the highest civil service examination in India conducted by UPSC (Union Public Service Commission). He also desire to provide helping hands to the poor students like him when he achieve his aim.



COMMUNITY ACTION FOR WATER, SANITATION AND NUTRITION, NORTH EAST INDIA

Community Action for Water, Sanitation and Nutrition, North East India' is a program which envisages reducing diarrhoea and improving nutrition among pregnant women, lactating mothers and children under five years of age in 40 remote villages in three district of Manipur - Senapati, Ukhurul and Tegnoupal. The project also visualizes promotion of safe drinking water, safe disposal of human waste, hygienic practices and enhance community competency towards preparation of nutritious food in the 40 remote villages. During the last one year, the project have conducted different activities which are proposed to address issues. The activities includes the following:.

The following activities :

1. Demonstration and Practical Training On Hand Washing and Toilet Use and Cleanliness

The supervisors and the staffs of the project conducted Demonstration and Practical Training on Hand washing and Toilet use and Cleanliness in 40 villages in three districts namely Senapati, Tegnoupal and Ukhurul. They also conducted the program on Practical Demonstration and Training on Nutritious food Preparation, weaning and complementary food preparation etc for mother and children in 40 villages.

A week prior to the program, all the Health workers were instructed about the 7 and 6 steps of hand washing through video clips, lecture, demonstration and practical training. After instructing them in detail the health workers were asked to act out. Then they are asked visit their own area and instruct the families especially mothers and children.



The supervisors and the VHWs demonstrated the different steps of hand washing and translated in their own local dialect as well as in English. After the demonstration, one of the participant was asked to demonstrate what they learned to see if they have understood properly. Then all the participants were asked to repeat and do it together. The participants properly followed all the instructions.

2. Practical Demonstration Training on Nutritious food Preparation, weaning and complementary food preparation etc for mother and children

Community Action for Health, Sanitation and Nutrition supervisors and the staffs conducted the program on Practical Demonstration Training on Nutritious food Preparation, weaning and complementary food preparation etc for mother and children in 40 villages.

A week prior to the programme, all the Health workers were called to the Health centre and were instructed about nutrition and the different types of food that is locally available. The different food products were collected and a demonstration was shown on the different types of food preparation which is good and nutritious for their health. The health workers went around the houses and prepared the mothers and adult below 19yrs for the programme. At first, an explanation was given on nutrition and the advantages as well disadvantages of lack of Nutritious food for adult, babies and mothers. The staffs also showed them the proper method of preparing food. They then also showed a short clip on Nutrition. The animators also collected different types of Nutritious food and pointed out the nutritious values and the content of vitamins in each food items. Furthermore the participants were made aware of the different sickness due to lack of vitamins, such as night blindness, lack of Vitamin A, Vitamin D born problems Etc.



3. Campaign on Nutrition, Sanitation and Water at Village

The supervisors and the team conducted a Campaign on Nutrition, Sanitation and Water in 40 Villages. The program began with an instruction on awareness of the present Covid Pandemic, the need to maintain social distance, the necessity of using mask, the proper way of washing hands.

Around 150 participants were present for the program including women, men and children.



The resource person explained to the participants the purpose of the program and brought to their awareness the different diet that is needed for our body. Furthermore, the participants were informed about the different Nutritious foods that are required to maintain good health. After a short introduction by the resource person all the participants went for street rally with placards starting from the main road of the Village till the public ground. Many of them participated for the rally.

4. Village Level Health Camp on Nutrition

A Health Camp on Nutrition was conducted in 40 villages in the three districts of Senapati, Ukhrul, and Tegnoupal. Around 200 people were present for Health Camp including children, men and women.

Before the health camp kicked off, a short talk on pandemic Covid-19 was given. The animators of the program explain the reason for maintaining social distance, wearing of masks, washing of hands and the use of hand sanitizer, as a measure to protect from the corona virus. Besides this, the animator of the program went on to give a talk on the prevention of HIV the mode of transmission from one person to another. After the short talk, the Health Camp program began. All the participants of the Health Camp maintained social distance, wearing masks and used the hand sanitizer.



The resource person showed to the participants the different vegetables that are good for health. Pregnant women were given a clear instruction and information on what foods to be taken for the good health of the baby and their own health. People suffering from hypertension, diabetics were also instructed about the necessary diet they should take. There was also ANC check- up for those who are pregnant. The resource person also advice the participants especially those with poor health on how to improve their health by taking food that are nutritious and locally and easily available. The participants benefited much from the Health Camp. Some vitamins, and nutritious food were distributed to the participants.

5. Motivational Training VHSNC Leaders

The Health Supervisor welcomed all the VHSNC and explained to them the purpose of the meeting.. The following Agendas were highlighted:

1. What are the responsibilities of VHSNC.
2. To be more concerned of the health of their people.
3. To teach to the people about the Covid-19. How to protect ourselves, our family, and our people from this pandemic.



EMPOWERMENT OF CHILDREN THROUGH CHILDREN'S PARLIAMENTS

The project Empowerment of children through children's parliament promote children to participate in issues of importance. Children in teens, as they grow up, seem to have a new sense of power. They feel they are in a new world which offers its own challenges and possibilities. When elders give advice the youngsters feel they are giving yesterday's answers to today's situations. This is especially now as they normally are more at ease with cell phones, computers and such items than we grown-ups are. Children seem to know better and they believe the elders are outdated. Children parliaments are the platforms where they can come together, discuss together, decide together and involve together in action and in fun. Through children's parliament they turn out to be good and responsible. With children's parliament programme, importance will be given to bridge school method to reduce school dropout and increase the attendance in the school. Other activities like motivational classes, competitions, cultural activities give platform for the children to exhibit and develop their talents.

Formation of Village Children's Parliament will be opted as an essential tool to address the child right issues, bring change in the villages. Since the children of new project areas are subjected to various social injustices, inequalities, poverty, corruption, terrorism, unemployment, drop-outs, child trafficking, disease and atrocities against women, children, exclusion of persons with disability and socially and economically weak, global warming and so on. There are also a lots of case in the villages where children took up arms and join underground movement either because parents could not effort to provide education, or unhappy with their friends or when demands are not met.

This project areas are very much relevant to promote the platforms for children where they can cultivate basic human relationship among themselves in their own neighborhood and the importance of children's participation in self-governance and in the above whole processes by educating, organizing and empowering them which alone will lead to the much needed social change through a program called "*Children's Parliament*".

Children's Parliament is not only an education process in its strict sense but also it is a children's Movement with deliberations, interventions and actions at neighborhood level of 25 to 30 families. Here in Children Parliaments, the children come together with all their freedom to share their concerns, thoughts, opinions and their needs and eventually get together to address all the above with various participative initiations, deliberations, activities and

Observation of Human Rights

The International Human Rights Day was observed in the area covered by Children Empowerment through Children Parliament in the State of Manipur. The day was observed by the children of the village, the parents of the children, partners in the Children Parliament project and the elders of the village. The observation of the International Human Rights Day brought to the fore, the importance of Human Rights and the need to uphold it. In the speeches given by the speakers on the auspicious occasion by important persons of the village like the Village Chief, Presidents/Secretaries of the Women and the Youth Clubs, they explained what Human Rights is, who provides the



Human Rights and how we can address when human rights are violated in any country. In the Children's Parliament center at Lamlongei, Fr. Biju, the Director, explained Human Rights as an alienable right of each and every person born to this earth or universe. He also explained to the gathering about the Children Parliament and how development can be brought about with the involvement of children from a very young age. Mrs. Lydia explained the genesis of International Day of Human Rights observation. Universal Declaration of Human Rights was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly. UDHR is an inalienable right which is entitled to every human being- regardless of race, colour, religions, sex, language, political, national, property, birth or other status. She explained in short about the rights that are provided to the Indians by the Constitution of India. The right to equality, fraternity, Life, food, clothing, shelter, right to education, freedom of speech and opinion was explained to the children. Emphasis was given that no one can violate these rights and when violated, law can be used to get these rights, which is entitled to each and every human being. Ms. Ratna, President of Lamjing LamtakLup, a Women Organization of the village talked about equality and the use of resources by all, irrespective of place of origin or tribe etc., taking the local context under consideration.





A. Field Visit to Purum Chumbang village.

On 5th March 2021, a field visit was made to Purum Chumbang village, Chandel District, Manipur. The purpose of this visit was to conduct election of Children's Parliament at Purum Chumbang village. Though the project started its implementation from the year 2020, due to Covid-19 Pandemic, gathering of children in big numbers was not permitted and therefore, the field animators could not carry the formal election process till March 2021. The field animators had been training the children in the process of conducting election and imparting the knowledge of Children's Parliament during their daily classes in morning and evening.



The election for Purum Chumbang village was carried out at Hope, Care Primary school hall. The field animator welcome and introduce Mr. Simon, the field supervisor and Miss Apem, Principal, Hope, Care Primary school. Mr. Simon, thank^{ed} Miss Apem for providing her school hall to conduct the Children's Parliament election. Miss Apem gave a few words of encouragement for the children. Firstly, introduction of each child was carried out and the election process follows later. There were more than 40 children present for the election but only 30 children were selected and form as one group and election was carried out for 30 children only. The remaining children formed 2nd group of Children's Parliament in the village and their election was not conducted on the same due to shortage of time.

B. Field Visit to Purum Lainingkhul village.

Field visit to Purum Lainingkhul village was made on 6th March 2021. Lainingkhul village has 70 families. There are 30 children presently enrolled under the children's Parliament Program. The purpose of this visit was to conduct election for Children's Parliament in Purum Lainingkhul. Due to Covid-19 Pandemic, the field animator could not conduct the election of Children's Parliament in the year 2020. The field animators had been training the children the process of conducting election during their daily classes in morning and evening.

The election for Purum Lainingkhul village was carried out at village Primary School. The field animator welcomed and introduced Mr. Simon, the field supervisor, Mr. Y Mono, Chairman, and Mr. M Chungrim, Secretary. Mr. Simon, highlighted the importance of children's parliament and why Purum Lainingkhul was selected as one of the beneficiaries of the project. He also thanked the village chairman and secretary for providing the class room to conduct the Children's Parliament election. Mr. M Chungrim assured his support on behalf of the villagers and thank DSSS, Imphal and Mr. Simon for selecting Lainingkhul village as beneficiary of the project. Firstly, each child introduced themselves and it was followed by the election process. Only 16 children were present for the election as many could not turn up.





In the Children's Parliament center at Purum Chumbang, the resource person, Mr. Th. Apem, Headmistress of Hope Care School, Purum Chumbang explained about the theme of this year's Human Rights Day : 'Recover better. Stand up for Human Rights'. She explained the theme in the context of COVID-19 Pandemic and how the Right to health calls for each and every person to take action for good health amidst the pandemic and the world to recover better from the pandemic. She gave an emphasis on the right to education as there are many drop outs in the village.



At Purum Lainingkhul, the resource person, Mr. Mk Daairil spoke about Human rights and talked to the participants about the historic movement led by Nelson Mandela for freedom of his people.

The Resource person at Chandonpokpi village Ms. Th. Theisini , Women Sec. Chandonpokpi Baptist Church talked about right to education and women rights. Mr. Th. Minthing, President, Chothe CLAM also talked on the right to education and the duties. Mr. Romeo spoke about the rights of children and the importance of education.

Mr. L. Sunny, the Headman of Purum Tampak village, Mr. Kh. Dampuh , President, Purum Tampak Sporting Club (PTSC), Mr. Phaihungir of PTSC and Mr. Y. Mohonsing , Pastor of Purum Tampak, spoke on the occasion.

At Chandropoto, the resource persons were Mr. Pr. Simthar , the Chief of Chandropoto, Mr. Y. Isaac, Teacher and Mr. Abunglen, the Teacher cum Animator. The resource persons talked on Child Rights especially that of education and the need to give active cooperation to the program as it aims at development of the children and of the village.

The children at Lamlongei took part in a drawing competition and were given prizes. At Purum Chumbang village also, children took part in a drawing competition that was conducted on that day and prizes were given to the winners. The children also sang and participated in various activities. One of the guest invited on the day at Lamlongei, Mr. Krishnamani, working in the Manipur Police said that the children attending such kind of awareness programs are fortunate as they are exposed to information and knowledge not found in their school curriculum. The leaning from such programs will be remembered by the children throughout their life. Cooperation and words of encouragement to the children for taking active part in the project in future was also given to the students and to the parents present for the occasion. It was indeed a very good and enlightening programme for the children covered by the children empowerment project. There was a good number of participants for the program in each of the venue where it was celebrated. In all the centres, there were around 27- 65 participants for the observation of the International Human Rights Day. The participants were served light refreshment arranged by the Animator cum Teacher in charge of the Children Parliament Centres.





C. Field Visit to Purum Tampak village.

The third Field visit of Mr. Simon for the month of March was made on the 11th of March 2021 at Purum Tampak. The village has 110 families. There are 35 children presently enrolled under the children's Parliament Program. The purpose of this visit was to conduct election of Children's Parliament in Purum Tampak. Due to Covid-19 Pandemic,



the field animator could not conduct the election of Children's Parliament in Purum Tampak. The field animators had been conducting the daily tuition class and imparting the knowledge about the children's parliament.

The election for Purum Tampak village was carried out at village Community hall. The field animator welcomed all the children for the election and introduced Mr. Simon, the field supervisor. The children were to made to introduce themselves first. The election process was once again explained by Mr. Simon to the children and the election was carried out accordingly.

D. Field Visit to Lamlongei, Imphal

On the 12th March 2021, Children's Parliament election was carried out for the children of Lamlongei at DSSS, Imphal Conference hall. Mr. David, Panchayat Member, Mrs. Ongbi, Meirapaibi Secretary were the special guest on the day of election. Mr. Simon, highlighted the importance of children's parliament and why Lamlongei was selected as one of the beneficiaries of project. The project started implementation from the year 2020, but due to Covid-19 Pandemic, gathering of children in big numbers was not permitted and therefore, the field animators could not carry the formal election process till March 2021. The field animators had been imparting the knowledge of Children's Parliament and the process of conducting election during their daily classes in morning and evening.





COVID-19 RESPONSES OF DSSS

DSSS carried out relief for the people of Manipur, especially for the daily wage earners, marginal farmers, people living in rented houses and people stranded at places away from their homes and villages. The first assistance was extended to the people living in rented houses in Imphal, daily wage earners, migrant workers, widows, orphans and people who had not got any facility from the Government related to COVID-19 on 8th April 2020 at Imphal East. Each family was given food provisions such as 5kgs of rice, 1kg of Dal, 1kg salt, ½kg haldi, Dettol soap, hand wash and 5 masks.

With the lock down extended for the third time, the daily wage earners, people in rented houses, small scale business owners and farmers were suffering a lot due to scarcity of food items and exorbitant rates of essential commodities. In many villages, people suffered as things were not available for the people in the villages and they could not travel to the nearby markets to buy things. Farmers were the great sufferers as they could not sell their products on time. Therefore, DSSS reached out to the people in the far flung villages with some aid in order to make their difficult days bearable and keep the kitchen flame burning. Essential commodities such as **rice, dal, salt, haldi, soap, hand wash, phenyl and masks were distributed** in 8 Districts covering 3986 families in 46 villages. Food provisions, sanitizers and masks were distributed. In all the Districts, the DCs were informed and with their permission and knowledge, the relief work was carried out. All norms recommended by the WHO were followed while carrying out the relief work. The details of items given and the villages covered are given as attachment.

DSSS is part of the Inter-Agency Group (IAG)-Manipur Coordination with the Director of DSSS as the Convenor. A video conference meeting was held on 7th April 2020 with World Vision, Manipur Baptist Convention, Oxfam-India, WSDC, Chandel, Centre for Women and Girls, DSSS, Sphere India to discuss on updating of IAG-Manipur State in response to COVID-19 pandemic; Identifying avenues in collaboration with stakeholders and forward plans of IAG.

Food (100 kgs of rice, 1 bag each of Dal and salt) was also deposited to the Food Bank at DC Office, Imphal East from DSSS Imphal.

The Organic farmers of DSSS in Noney and Ukhrul Districts also supplied organic vegetables to the State Organic Nodal agency in Imphal during the lockdown which made it possible for the people in the valley areas of Manipur to get vegetables with the inter State transportation and flights not operational making it especially difficult for Manipur, which is hugely dependent on other States even for vegetables.



Awareness program on COVID -19 was also conducted for the partners of DSSS - the Self Help Group members and the children associated with DSSS. Though there is a widespread awareness about the prevention of Corona Virus in the media, many people in the villages do not have much idea about the prevention and the necessary follow up incase if they have the symptoms. Therefore, DSSS through the staff reached out to it's partners in family to family or in a small groups consisting of 10 to 15 members to spread the awareness on COVID -19.

Due to the intervention made by DSSS, the Government of Manipur recognized the service of DSSS and its efforts to help out the people in need in the fight against COVID -19. DSSS was thus designated as the Nodal / Mother NGO for Imphal East District of Manipur, by the Deputy Commissioner of Imphal East, Dr. Rangitabali Waikhom on 24th April 2020.

The govt. in the latest update have passed an order to deposit the relief materials in the food bank of the Govt. of Manipur. Much of the philanthropic activities of DSSS came to a standstill due to the increasing number of covid cases with the return of people from other states and the lock-down imposed by the government.

WOMEN CENTERED INCLUSIVE DEVELOPMENT AND SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE FOR TRIBAL PROJECT No.: 73723

Introduction:

The Corona Virus (COVID-19) pandemic is a defining global health crisis of our time and one of the greatest threats human kind has seen and faced hitherto. The pandemic is much more than a health crisis. It is also a socio-economic crisis unprecedented in recent history. Considering its wide spread, it has the potential to create devastating social, economic and political effects that will leave deep and longstanding scars. It reached Manipur within a short span of time. Manipur too responded by locking down the entire state on 24th March 2020, initially for 21 days. The Lockdown has been continuing till date in various phases. And after eight months of stringent lockdown, the covid-19 cases got reduced and the people were once again able to start their normal activities. During this period that is in the month of December 2020, DSSS office was able to resume and carry out few activities before the end of year. The COVID-19 pandemic has already had profound impacts on the daily activities of Diocesan Social Service Society, Imphal due to lockdown imposed by the Government of Manipur.

APPOINTMENT OF PROJECT STAFF

The project was sanctioned on 09/11/2020 with a sum of Rs. 35,84,856/- as first instalment amount. The process of recruiting project staff soon started in the month of December 2020. One project Manager, 2 field supervisors, 2 food processing trainers and 1 accountant were appointed. The process of training the staffs got delayed due to the restrictions in movement imposed by the government of Manipur. On the other hand every village has their own set of rules and regulations on movement of people and social gatherings. All the project activities of Diocesan Social Service Society were adversely affected during this period. Though there were signs of decreased Covid - 19 positive cases, all the restrictions were not lifted.

STAFF ORIENTATION

Two days orientation program was organized at DSSS, Imphal on ^{the} 10th and 11th January 2021. Mrs. Lydia, Project Manager of Peace Project and Mr. Ken Golmei, Accountant of DSSS, Imphal trained the newly recruited staff. Basic topics like responsibility of Field Supervisors, reporting system and fund utilization at field level were oriented in detail.





FORMATION OF SHGs

In the month of January & February 2021, Mr. Dk. Solomon, field supervisor of Chandel and Machi block formed SHGs in the 15 villages. Under the Chakpikarong block, SHGs was not formed due to sudden resignation of field supervisor Mr. Terence. Mean while advertisement for recruiting new Field Supervisors from project area was given out. In the month of March 2021, Mr. Thanga was appointed as new Field Supervisor in Chapikarong block. Mr. Thanga was given the responsibility of visiting all the villages placed under him for building rapport with the village Chairman/chiefs. The 2nd Wave of Covid 19 hit Manipur in the last week of April 2021. All the project activities were kept on hold again. Mr. Thanga could not formed the SHGs in his project areas because his movement was restricted again.

CHALLENGES FACED

1. Project activities could not be carried out till date due to restriction of public gatherings.
2. Every village has their rules and regulations of Covid-19 SOPs, therefore, entry of staff in project villages are not possible till 10th of August 2021.
3. Staff salary paid from January 2021 to April 2021 and kept on hold for further payments because no activities could be carried out.
4. The second wave of covid - 19 hit the state in the last week of April 2021, and the government of Manipur has imposed stricter lockdown in the state.

WAY OUT FORWARD

1. The lockdown has relaxed since the 10th August 2021, and the action plan for coming months are planned out.
2. Maximum activities will be carried out till further lockdown is imposed.





BUILDING BRIDGES FOR PEACE AND CONFLICT TRANSFORMATION IN NORTH EAST INDIA (BBPACT)

Peace education is a humanizing process. Peace education prevents violence and builds a culture of peace in the midst of injustice. Peace building is a noble act through which we can build bridges and bring peace to the families, communities and to the entire world. Through this project we are trying to build this peace which is very essential for the people of Manipur. This project is being implemented in three districts of Manipur namely Chandel, Churachandpur and Ukhrul.

The approved activities of the project are duly implemented by the project staff in the field. Reports of the events conducted with a narration of the process involved in conducting an activity, results achieved are as given below:

Activities during the period April 2020 to March 2021

1. Seminar cum meeting of heads of schools:

Training for the heads of the schools was conducted, in which 12 of them participated in the program. The teachers were re-oriented on peace so as to enable them to efficiently deal with students who are already disinterested with anything to do with schools as a result of the year long lockdown of schools, the need for awareness among students with regard to facing the life challenges, problems, addictions, global warming and the need to inculcate peace. They were trained on gender, human rights, peace building and conflict management. Through this training they were equipped to handle the daily conflicts that take place in their locality, in the schools and in the society.

2. Training of SHG on Peace Building

The women SHGs in CCpur, Ukhrul and Chandel were given peace building seminar regularly for better handling of the conflict situations in their villages, homes and in the society. They were made aware of the importance of women's significant role in all round progress and development of human society. Their participation in all spheres including in peace process for the cause of community development is very crucial. Thus, women were given the understanding that they can play better role for bringing peace in the community.

3. Training of SHG on women empowerment & entrepreneurship:

During this reporting period, the SHG women in CCpur, Chandel and Ukhrul were given training on women empowerment and entrepreneurship which were very essential for their daily life during this COVID- 19 lock down. The current economic condition of Churachandpur, Chandel and Ukhrul were really pathetic during this COVID pandemic period. Within this lockdown many daily wage earners had to go through hard times. As there are no means of making money or earning, they ended up in debt leading to many conflicts within the families. The pandemic does not only challenge us financially but also mentally and emotionally. Input sessions were given to the women on Entrepreneurship concept & employment generation, enterprising trades relevant in the area, SHG as a financial resource centre and change in the status of woman through economic empowerment. Through this training the women became aware of the relation between individual economic status and the development of the area.





1. **Peace Club Meetings and Celebration**

Peace Club meetings and Celebrations were conducted in the schools and colleges for the students. They were given input sessions on the importance of critical thinking, dialogue & mediation as peace building tools, ways to develop skills in peace building & apply it especially in the schools and colleges among themselves and in their ecosystem.

2. **Peace Seminar in Colleges**

The Seminar on 'Peace Building' was conducted for the college students in Ukhrul. The students were given sessions on the concept of peace & peace building in the society to address various conflicts structural, societal and personal. They were also taught ways to build and maintain peace starting from personal level.

3. **Community based Seminar on Responsible Parenthood**

Parents at CCpur, Chandel and Ukhrul were given seminar on responsible parenthood. They were given sessions on the importance of 0-7 years in child's life, effective communication, love and care to overcome anger and violent behavior amongst children, importance of discipline at home and fine parenting styles for better life.

4. **Training of Teachers**

The teachers were given training on what is conflict, conflict transformation, basic core life skills, communication skills, interpersonal relationship, decision making, problem solving, creative thinking, self awareness, how to cope with stress & emotion, Concept of peace, positive and negative peace, role and task of peace maker and mediation. The teachers realized the importance of being equipped with proper knowledge of peace, mediation & conflict resolution skills as they play the crucial role in molding the students.

5. **Celebration of Peace and Environment Day (tree plantation)**

Input sessions were given to the students on the need to start peace initiatives in the villages, peace actions that can be taken up by students and importance of peace gardens in the schools. Through the peace & environment day celebration & tree plantation a sense of enthusiasm and responsibility was instilled in the students on caring for the environment and thereby creating a peaceful ecosystem.

1. **Training for youth on life skills, conflict resolution, mediation and leadership.**

The youth were given training on time management, decision making, saving money, importance of cleanliness and hygiene, concept of reducing food wastage and how to be self dependent. The youth learnt the needs to practice from early childhood in order to have effective life skills and that will bring drastic change in their life as a youth as well as an adult.

2. **District level dialogue for peace, conflict resolution and human rights once a year at three places**

During the dialogue, the participants actively shared their peaceful coping mechanisms used during the hard pandemic times and how conflict has been transformed and dealt by them and the fundamental right of each individual was also discussed. Participants also learnt about the types of peace, human rights and its principles and also were able to diagnose the problems leading to conflict and inhibition of freedom and peace building works in the villages.



Staff review meeting

Webinars meeting was organized and attended by the staff & management on COVID -19 mental health awareness program, building the right ecosystem, peace training & skill development, protection of environment & land alienation. The staffs were capacitated and the plans of activities were discussed and report for the period was shared.

Conclusion

The implementation of the peace program in the state of Manipur continues to take place with the active engagement of youth, men and women in the communities, academicians and social workers, internalizing and putting in to practice the learnings on peace through the stressful pandemic days. The supervisors and the staffs are hopeful of better times ahead so as to successfully implement the program and achieve the goal for peace in the society.
